Reconciliation: Saturdays at 2:45—3:45 PM or by appointment.

Matrimony: Marriage preparation is required. Please call Father Tony VanderLoop, Pastor, at 952-679-9415 at least eight months in advance.

Anointing: If you wish to receive an anointing please call the Parish Office: (952) 227-4000.

Communion for the Homebound: When we come together to pray at our Eucharistic liturgy, we do not forget the members of our community who are unable to be with us because of ill health. We remember them in our prayers, and we wish to include them in our Holy Communion. Members of our community bring the Blessed Sacrament to them to comfort them and to unite us in the Eucharist. We are not always aware of those who have this need. Please call the Parish Office to let us know if you or a member of your family would like to have Holy Communion brought to them. That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits: Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.

FROM THE PASTOR

And Yet It Grows

How does God's kingdom grow? Can you see it or predict it? Jesus talks about God's kingdom and its growth often, mostly in parables. With the images of daily life, he shows that daily life is not mundane. Everything can become something at which to marvel.

What is more normal than seed being sown? And then the seed lies in the ground, but look: it is growing. Day and night whether the sower is thinking about it or not, the seed grows and grows, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. Jesus adds that the man "knows not how".

Scientists have learned a great deal about how it grows, but this should only lead us to greater wonder at the way that God created the world, not less. Our wonder at the marvels of nature is meant to lead us to even greater wonder at the marvels of the supernatural realm. The kingdom of God is growing and we know not how. The farmer sows the seed. Yet he has not made the seed, nor does he directly produce the growth. He can only till the soil, water it, and take care of the plant faithfully. So it is with the kingdom of God. Parents can sow the seed of faith in their children's hearts. They can encourage its growth, but they cannot make it grow.

Sometimes it seems that the kingdom of God is not growing, but rather shrinking. Yet, God remains the sovereign Lord of growth and the harvest. God sends growth as his gift to let the fruit of his action ripen. A great example is that of the saints. Many saints grew in faith in the worst of times and situations. Yet, God was faithful to bring growth in their spiritual life. A great example was that in the little Polish town of Krakow, in 1920, a child was baptized with the name of Karol. A seed was sown, as small as a mustard seed. This man died on the eve of Divine Mercy Sunday, April 2nd, 2005 as Pope John Paul II and was a great saint. A giant tree grew up from a tiny mustard seed of faith. Many were able to nest in its branches. He, above all others, freed the world from Communism and gave courage and hope to many people. And the kingdom of God has grown.

“This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how. Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come.”

He said, “To what shall we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use for it? It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown in the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth. But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade.” With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it. Without par-

ables he did not speak to them,

but to his own disciples he explained everything in private.

CURSILLO IS COMING TO GA IN JUNE & JULY WHAT IS A CURSILLO WEEKEND?

The Cursillo Movement is introduced over a consecutive seventy-two-hour period called a "Three Day Weekend." During the three-day weekend, which begins Thursday evening and ends Sunday evening, a team of religious and lay personnel present a series of talks to the candidates and the entire group calls upon the Holy Spirit for enlightenment and guidance. The team and candidates live as a small Christian community over the weekend and discuss these talks in small groups. The discussions provide an opportunity to share insights about the presentations and hear how others received that same presentation. The talks and discussions cover a variety of topics including:

- The layperson's role within the Church
- Meaning of grace and sacraments
- Importance of prayer and the study of God
- Christian leadership and living Christianity in community.
- Our call to bring Christ to others and transform the very environments in which we live.
- The importance of supporting one another in our efforts to live a truly Christian life.

Throughout the weekend the participants will pray together, attend daily mass, and have an opportunity to receive the sacrament of reconciliation. Typically, by the end of the weekend, candidates have a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ and a better understanding of the power of the Holy Spirit. Also, candidates leave the weekend knowing that they have been called to spread the Word of God.

1. Parishes that are in the service of evangelization;
2. Missionary disciples who know Jesus's love and respond to his call; and
3. Youth and young adults in and for a Church that is always young.

You can take action to be a part of this process by

1. Complete the interest form in the slots in the Church pews and hand in to the collection basket.
2. Go online at GACHaska.org to complete your interest form.
3. Check out Archspm.org, our archdiocesan resource about the Synod Process.
4. Join a small group in the fall starting Sept 19 – 6 weekly sessions, 2 hours each.

Your input will help our local Church grow in understanding in the 3 Synod Focus Areas and help each of us reflect on our faith and our Church so we may better "reach out from the altar of Christ to Educate, Serve and Evangelize".

It's Time to Return to Mass

Dear Parishioners,

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, we've experienced various forms of difficult, albeit necessary separation. We've prayed patiently and faithfully for the end of the pandemic. We've endured loss of loved ones, jobs, time with family and friends and many other things. In these days of pain, sacrifice, and trust, many of us have grown in appreciation of and desire for some of those things we've had to do without: going out for a good burger, a shared cup of coffee with an elderly parent, big life celebrations like graduations and weddings.

As Catholics, while each of our circumstances has been unique, in some capacity and for some period of time, we've each had to go without fellowship and without the Holy Eucharist. We praise God that "in everything [He] works for good." (Rom 8:28) I pray that these absences have blessed us all with the time to reflect upon the joy that comes from fellowship, and the life that comes from the Eucharist.

Recognizing that both the Eucharist and our church communities are truly essential to the Christian life, the bishops and diocesan administrators across the state of Minnesota have announced that the **obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation will return July 1**. Practically, this means the weekend of July 3-4 (Saturday evening or anytime Sunday), the Catholic faithful are obligated to once more attend Mass in-person, unless special circumstances apply – for instance, if you are ill or caring for someone whose health is compromised. You can read about this decision, as well as the special circumstances I mention above, in recent letters from Archbishop Hebda (found at archspm.org/archbishopmassletter) and the Minnesota bishops (found at archspm.org/mccmassletter).

As the pandemic subsides and public gathering restrictions are lifted, it is reasonable that we return to worship together in person once more. We are **Created for Communion**. That is, we are created for communion with each other, and we are created for Holy Communion, "the source and summit of the Christian Life." (CCC 1324). We are **created for fellowship**. Just as the Father, Son and Holy Spirit have a living union, so are we created to reflect their union in our relationships with others. It is through our relational nature that we recognize our vocations and grow in love and holiness.

It is powerful when we come together to pray. Jesus tells us, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." (Matthew 18:20) Certainly, we can pray anywhere; the Lord invites us to relationship with Him. As such we can hear his voice and speak to him anywhere. There is something extra special about coming together in worship on the sabbath in the sanctuary. St. John Chrysostom said, "You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of the priests." (CCC 2179)

We are **created for the Eucharist**. While livestreaming, watching Mass on TV, and listening to it on the radio have been suitable ways to celebrate the Lord's Day when we could not come together in person and will continue to have their place, they lack one key piece: Jesus Himself. During the holy sacrifice of the Mass, Jesus Christ becomes truly present in the Eucharist. The bread and wine are not simply signs that lead us to Christ, but completely transform into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist.


The Catechism tells us "The principal fruit of receiving the Eucharist in Holy Communion is an intimate union with Christ Jesus." (CCC 1391) How beautiful that Jesus has given us a way to be intimate with Him. Holy Communion also wipes away venial sins, preserves us from future sin, unites us with the mystical body of the Church and other Christians, and commits us to the poor. Further, Jesus teaches us "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you." (John 6:53) We are created for and need Holy Communion.

Thanks be to God that He is answering our prayers! With the COVID-19 pandemic subsiding, we can return to the Communion for which we were created. I invite you to return to Mass, if you have not already. While the dispensation has not yet been lifted, we are celebrating Mass safely. With the Governor's Executive Order 21-21, we have room to welcome everyone home to Guardian Angels.

Even after the lift of the COVID-19 Sunday Mass obligation dispensation, dispensations always remain in place for moral or physical impossibilities, such as illness or caring for an ill family member.

The Creator of the Universe created us with a desire for communion with each other and with Him. I joyfully await the reunion of our parish family at Mass.

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
